

# **Executive Summary**

In 2013, nuclear energy experienced significant challenges and peaks of opportunity. Four plants announced closures bringing the total number of operating reactors from 104 to 100 in the U.S. Also, one plant closure in Canada, Hydro-Quebec's Gentilly Unit 2 nuclear power plant which has been operating safely and reliably since 1983 was shut down in December 2012. Coupled with plant closures comes the devastation of lost jobs and career instability. While NAYGN opened eight chapters in 2013, we anticipate chapter closures for 2014. NAYGN supported our colleagues at the closing plants but have seen the wave of closures as part of the life cycle of the industry and NAYGN membership.

Regardless of hurdles, NAYGN membership reached a significant milestone in 2013, 10,000 members. Surpassing 10,000 individual members since its inception has been an anticipated target. NAYGN continues to celebrate this accomplishment by engaging former leaders of the organization to put a spotlight on the growth and development over the last 15 years. NAYGN was able to reach this goal by launching so many new chapters such as Virgil C Summer Nuclear Station and Rolls-Royce Pittsburgh.

Although 2013 revealed serious challenges for the industry, NAYGN maintained a strong presence in nuclear advocacy. **NAYGN membership provided 93,848 hours of public information and professional development hours in 2013.** One public information opportunity was the U.S. NRC's series of 12 public hearings held all over the U.S. The meetings allowed public comment on a recent waste confidence court ruling. NAYGN members attended and provided comment at 11 of the 12 public meetings. NAYGN was the only consistent pro-nuclear organization at these meetings. Although the anti-nuclear community consistently avoided facts and exhibited disrespectful behavior at all the public meetings, the NAYGN membership respectfully provided poised and thoughtful comments. The NRC public meetings were ideal opportunities for NAYGN membership to show continued relevance to the industry.

The Canadian NAYGN members participated in Ontario's Long Term Energy Review and its successful outcome has resulted in moving forward with the Darlington refurbishment being approved by the government. NAYGN has participated in the Bruce License Renewal and will be participating in Darlington License Renewal public meetings.

The nuclear energy industry benefited from the release of a documentary called *Pandora's Promise* which follows 4 environmentalists and their stories as they consider both the challenges and benefits of nuclear power generation. NAYGN membership attended many private and public screenings of *Pandora's Promise* and was able to use the film to generate conversations and further advocate with peer groups through social media.

Aside from some of the unique opportunities in 2013, NAYGN continues to enhance its assets and programs. The new website is active and continues to be a resource for leadership. The 5<sup>th</sup> grade poster contest yielded hundreds of submissions and the Public Information Committee will continue the program next year with some enhancements based on feedback from NAYGN chapters. NAYGN's profile continues to elevate and gain notoriety, seeing recognition with a Platts Energy television interview and coverage in two articles in *Nuclear Power International* magazine. Also, NAYGN shared perspectives with the American Nuclear Society at the joint Young Members Group meeting in Washington, D.C.

The 2013 annual professional development conference in Washington, D.C. boasted 400 participants and a program focusing on inspiring leadership and reinforcing the key concepts of safety and security from across all nuclear sectors. For example, Representative Adam

Kinzinger keynoted and spent an hour sharing perspectives and insights on how to be a successful young professional. Approximately 300 participants visited Capitol Hill with pronuclear messages armed with the facts and their personal motivation about the benefits of nuclear science and technology. NAYGN members made a short film documenting the success of the Hill Day, which was then shown to industry executives at the Nuclear Energy Assembly.

The Canadian Annual Professional Development Day was equally successful and yielded record participation in Toronto.

NAYGN continues to influence the recruitment and retention of young professionals in nuclear, supporting multiple career awareness seminars, networking events, and members contributed to the next addition of the career survey to be released in 2014. Regional events continue to promote learning and networking amongst chapters.

Looking back upon 2013, NAYGN has accomplished much and the membership is proud of the work they have done. The organization has laid the groundwork to not only influence the future of nuclear science and technology, but to ensure its success and a continued key role for NAYGN and its members.

# **Strategic Initiatives**

Vision, Mission, and Strategic Planning

NAYGN's vision is:

Developing leaders to energize the future of nuclear.

The vision statement has enhanced the strategic planning process by providing a clear and concise statement to reflect the organization's desired future.

This vision statement complements the mission of NAYGN,

NAYGN provides opportunities for a young generation of nuclear enthusiasts to develop leadership and professional skills, create life-long connections, engage and inform the public, and inspire today's nuclear technology professionals to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

NAYGN is designed to accomplish the above vision and mission while focusing on five strategic initiatives:

- Provide a forum for the <u>Professional Development</u> of its membership.
- Actively participate in <u>Public Information</u> by informing and educating the general population about nuclear science and technology.
- Actively participate in <u>Recruitment and Retention</u> for NAYGN and the Nuclear Industry.
- Contribute to the Knowledge Transfer among generations of nuclear professionals.
- Provide opportunities for members to <u>Network.</u>

NAYGN's vision, mission, and strategic initiatives are outlined in a forward-looking five (5) year strategic plan.

#### Professional Development

The 2013 NAYGN Annual Workshop and Conference, Securing the Future of Nuclear: Safety, Technology, and Leadership, was held May 12-14 at the Grand Hyatt Hotel in Washington D.C. More than 400 NAYGN members attended the 2013 conference to learn more about the technology, regulations, and leadership skills that keep the nuclear industry safe, vibrant and growing. Conference participants were able to attend a variety of specialty breakout sessions that focused on one or more topics of safety, security, and/or professional development. In addition, the conference included a teambuilding event to promote networking and knowledge transfer amongst the young professionals. The conference concluded with a hill day visit for conference participants to visit federal policy makers and share our own perspectives. The Candian NAYGN members produced a comprehensive report of their conference and posted on the NAYGN website.

The professional development committee hosted a series of webinars in 2013. In January of 2013, NAYGN was addressed by USNRC Commissioner William Magwood through webinar. A technical webinar was held in February to discuss the Small Modular Reactors. NAYGN also hosted a series of webinars on career development and success during the months of June, July and August. Finally, a special NAYGN webinar was held in September 2013 through NEI to discuss some of the recent plant closures in the US. Individual regions continued to host their own Professional Development Workshops throughout the year. In October 2013, the Professional Development team began planning the content and identifying speakers for the 2014 PD Conference.

#### **Public Information**

NAYGN continues efforts to improve NAYGN's presence in social media through the Clean Energy Insight (CEI) and NAYGN websites, Facebook, LinkedIn, and Twitter. In 2013, the Public Information Committee posted 15 articles to CEI on topics spanning public nuclear debate, NAYGN reflections, industry support, and public information tools, held one webinar, and introduced a new Public Information incentive award.

As the longest running NAYGN public information activity, the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade drawing contest still continues to be a successful outreach activity for NAYGN. This year we received a record high number of 6113 votes online for the winning drawing!

The Government Outreach committee supported 300 NAYGN conference participants in the NAYGN US Hill Day event where members were able to go to Capitol Hill and meet with elected representatives and their staff.

#### Recruiting & Retention

Recruiting and Retention activities are focused on 1) attracting new young professionals to the nuclear science and technology industry, 2) aiding the industry in retaining young professionals, and 3) recruiting members to NAYGN as an organization.

In 2013, NAYGN sought opportunities to promote career awareness at several industry conferences (NSBE, INENS and ANS).

NAYGN also added eight local chapters in 2013, bringing the total chapters of NAYGN in December 2013 to 109.

#### Knowledge Transfer

The Knowledge Transfer & Retention (KT&R) Committee focused on creating tools to improve knowledge transfer both internally and externally to NAYGN. NAYGN-Internal knowledge transfer and retention has been a topic for this committee for many years. Considering NAYGN's growth over the past decade, it has been quite a challenge to maintain and retain all of the documents that have made this growth possible. A landmark achievement for the KT&R committee in 2013 was the development of a Knowledge Management Plan for NAYGN. This plan includes a concise guide to NAYGN documents, their storage locations, and a document retention and destruction schedule. To complement the Knowledge Management Plan, the KT&R committee researched options for storage of organizational documents that are not intended for public view via the NAYGN website. After considering many options, a Google Drive for the NAYGN Core was established.

Considering the broader topic of KT&R across the nuclear industry, the NAYGN KT&R committee collaborated with the benchmarking committee to include a Knowledge Transfer section in the Career Survey that was issued to members in 4Q 2013. This is the first time that KT&R topics will be included in the Career Survey instead of issuing a separate KT&R survey. Combining the surveys will allow for enhanced cross analysis of KT&R topics with data on salary, career satisfaction, and NAYGN satisfaction.

Another KT&R initiative in 2013 was to develop a KT&R award to recognize local chapters who are making strides in effective KT&R in their workplaces. This award will be given for the first time at the 2014 PD Conference.

## **Networking**

In addition to the networking opportunities offered at the professional development conference in May, 2013, several events were held on the Regional Level to encourage members to network. Many regional-level events were planned and executed, in addition to the numerous networking opportunities that local chapters offer to their own members. In addition to all of these events, NAYGN continues to develop an online networking presence through various social media sites. With NAYGN's online presence and activities in all of the seven NAYGN regions, NAYGN members were offered more opportunities than ever to network.

#### **NAYGN Infrastructure**

The infrastructure of NAYGN exists to support the organization's strategic initiatives and meet the needs of our members. Standing, special and regional committees are employed to accomplish these goals. Standing committees are those included in the bylaws. Special committees are established by the President for advancing the objectives of NAYGN. They may become Standing committees with a bylaw change.

#### Professional Development

#### **Professional Development Committee**

The purpose of the PD committee is successful execution of the Annual Conference while supporting any additional Professional Development opportunities. The 2013 NAYGN Annual Workshop and Conference, Securing the Future of Nuclear: Safety, Technology, and Leadership, was held May 12-14 at the Grand Hyatt Hotel in Washington D.C. More than 400 NAYGN members attended the 2013 conference. This continues the increasing trend of attendance at NAYGN Conferences. Note that the 2012 NAYGN conference was jointly held with the International Youth Nuclear Congress (IYNC) and attendance metrics were not separated for each organization.

#### **Benchmarking Committee**

The Benchmarking committee is responsible for the development, distribution and analysis of a survey of the NAYGN membership to quantify factors which impact job selection, career satisfaction and effective professional development among young professionals. In 2013, the committee kicked off efforts to re-survey our members via an update to the well-received 2012 report. The bi-annual KT&R survey was successfully combined with the career survey. The combined survey was opened for one month in the fall and received over 900 Reponses (31% of the active membership). Conclusions and findings will be presented in the report, to be issued in May of 2014.

#### **Student Education**

We received approximately 800 student drawings for the 2013  $15^{th}$  Annual NAYGN  $4^{th}$  and  $5^{th}$  Grade Drawing Contest. A record high number of 6113 votes were collected online via the Clean Energy Insight website. The winners are listed below and their drawings are included in the report attachments.

#### Social Media

Efforts to improve NAYGN's presence in social media included the maintenance of NAYGN Facebook, LinkedIn, Twitter and Linked-In accounts, in addition to NAYGN's Clean Energy Insight blog. In 2013, the Social Media committee improved NAYGN's online presence by more than doubling NAYGN's Twitter following and tweeting more than 1500 tidbits of nuclear information.

#### **Intersociety Relations**

This committee is responsible for promoting and maintaining relationships between NAYGN and other technical and professional societies with an interest in nuclear science and technology. NAYGN will continue to participate and support various industry groups including but not limited to The Nuclear Energy Institute (NEI), American Nuclear Society (ANS), Institute of Nuclear Power Operations (INPO), International Youth Nuclear Congress (IYNC), Canadian Nuclear Society (CNS), Canadian Nuclear Association (CNA), Health Physics Society (HPS), Women in Nuclear (WiN), and others. Key interactions included working closely with American Nuclear Society Young Members Group to plan the 2013 Young Professionals Congress.

#### **Government Outreach**

One of the benefits of the annual professional development meeting being held in Washington, DC is NAYGN's opportunity to organize a 'Hill Day'. In 2013, 300 conference participants were able to go to Capitol Hill and meet with elected representatives and their staff. Between the official schedule of meetings, organized by NEI, and the coordinated "drop-by" visits with offices, NAYGN touched half of the 535 Congressional offices in a matter of 5 hours. NAYGN continues to raise the bar on nuclear advocacy and Hill Day is the single largest pro-nuclear effort done by the industry on Capitol Hill.

#### Recruiting & Retention

#### **Recruiting & Retention**

NAYGN inspired students to consider working in the nuclear industry by staffing booths at established career fairs. At these events, NAYGN volunteers provided a fresh perspective of the young generation in the nuclear industry. Volunteers were also very successful with assisting company recruiters with addressing technical questions about nuclear technology.

#### **Membership Committee**

In order to remain in good standing, members must renew on an annual basis. The membership database is reset in conjunction with the Elections to minimize the burden on the members.

- While there are over 10,000 members in NAYGN over the organization's 15 year life.
- The new website allows for members to have a personal login. In 2013, the new website and login system was used for the annual member re-set and election.

#### **Nominating Committee**

The 2013 elections were held in March. Contested elections were held for the Public Information Chair, Communications Chair, US Affairs Chair, and Vice President. The successful candidates were Laura Brown (GE Hitachi), Maggie Collins (CB&I), Jimmy Hennen (Westinghouse), and Felix Meissner (Westinghouse).

The election communication strategy was an integrated effort that included support from the webinar chair, membership chair and webmaster. 2013 was the first year that we used the NAYGN website for polling and election communications. Unbeknownst to the end users, the election team worked behind-the-scenes through many challenges to configure the new system and run a successful election and annual member reset. In addition to the normal communication mechanisms, multiple individual reminder emails were sent to every member asking them to participate in the election. The strategy also included hosting a webinar for members to meet the individuals on the ballot.

#### **Knowledge Transfer Committee**

All of the aforementioned KT&R achievements in 2013 were made possible through the hard work and engagement of this year's KT&R committee. This committee includes members from across NAYGN's diverse membership and employment base, which added value in the development of KT&R resources and tools.

#### **Sustainability Committee**

This committee was initiated in 2009 in order to retain the lessons learned and historical knowledge of former Core members. This committee continues to provide insight and advice to the Core when requested. In 2013, the Sustainability committee was asked to review a major proposed change to the NAYGN membership criteria. This committee sought input from a wide variety of past Core members and NAYGN founders prior to presenting a recommendation to the NAYGN Core. This committee is a valuable resource for NAYGN to ensure continuity and long-term viability of the organization.

#### Canada

2013 was a year of great success for Canadian NAYGN Chapters. In June, at the Canadian Nuclear Society (CNS) Annual Conference, the eight Canadian Chapters came together for the annual Professional Development Day. The seminar was held in Toronto, Ontario, and was coordinated by the AMEC Nuclear Safety Solutions Chapter based in Toronto. The event was very well executed and provided opportunity for young industry workers to develop professionally and meet more seasoned nuclear professionals who joined on behalf of the CNS. This event provided all attendees with an opportunity to network with peers and leaders. Professional development conferences such as the one held in Toronto, Ontario will continue to be organized such that further connections can be established amongst the young nuclear generation. The key message was NA-YGN is there to foster a professional's meaningful contribution to one's team, becoming more effective in the workplace, and ultimately assists members to help advance in their career and move to new positions where you can lead, manage, influence, coach, and mentor others.

Another major event, and noteworthy success, was the Canadian Workshop on Fusion Energy Science and Technology (CWFEST-2013). The event was hosted at the University of Ontario, Institute of Technology. With more than 60 members gathered from all over North America to participate in a multitude of workshops revolving around fusion using focal region of multiple high current plasma beams, Engineering Issues in Fusion Reactor Design and Alternative Concepts., International Perspectives on Fusion Energy Development and youth's role in development of Fusion Energy in the coming decade.

NAYGN actively participated at the Long Term Energy Plan Review for Ontario, which includes province-wide consultations on a variety of topics including the province's mix of energy sources such as wind, solar and nuclear, and conservation.

Last but not least, NAYGN led a pro-nuclear conversation in various different settings including presentation at IEEE (Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers), Engineering Innovation Forum (EIF) and Professional Engineers of Ontario (PEO)

Each chapter has shared in the successes of the overall Canadian Regional, but it is important to also highlight that each individual chapter has been active, growing, and evolving this past year.

#### **Atlantic Region**

On August 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup>, 2013, the Atlantic Region held its first-ever Joint Regional Event with the Northeast Region, hosted at and around Constellation's corporate headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland. The conference theme was "Communicating Nu-Clearly". The morning sessions included panel discussions on small modular reactors and international nuclear development, but in keeping with the conference theme, the focus of the afternoon sessions was on developing communication skills, both in the context of interpersonal interactions and nuclear advocacy situations. The conference was a huge success, with over 90 participants and guests in attendance from chapters spanning from Virginia to New England.

NAYGN members from the Atlantic Region also supported the industry's public information efforts at the NRC Waste Confidence hearings this fall. Several members were in attendance at the public meeting at NRC headquarters on November 14<sup>th</sup>, and several more delivered public comments at NRC headquarters in Rockville, Maryland.

Projects for the region in 2014 include more inter-chapter outreach opportunities in the DC Metro area as well as another joint-regional event with the Northeast. The Atlantic Region continues to be a great place to be in NAYGN.

#### **Carolinas Region**

In 2013, the Carolinas Region expanded their horizons, advocated for the industry, and developed stronger working relationships. Multiple viewings of the nuclear documentary Pandora's Promise were made available to members across the region. Members gathered in droves in Charlotte to support the industry for the NRC's Waste Confidence Hearings. In a fresh change to previous years, several smaller localized regional events were held instead of one large event. This allowed chapters to strengthen their relationships within the region.

#### **Midwest Region**

The chapters in the region were very active during the year with nearly 15,000 total hours spent on professional development, networking, public information and community service. Over 35 members from the region attended the national professional development conference with almost every chapter sending at least 1 member. Also during the year three chapters were added to the region with chapters planning to kick-offs in 2014.

#### **Northeast Region**

A combined regional event was held in 2013 between the Northeast region and the Atlantic region. This event, titled, "Communicating Nu-Clearly" was held in Baltimore, Maryland and featured communications training from our very own NAYGN members, Adam LeRoy and Adam Malinowski, as well as a public communications workshop by Brian Meeley from Potomac Communications. The Northeast region had over 23,000 hours of Professional Development, Community Service, Public Information, and Networking during 2013 led by the following heavily involved chapters; Exelon East, PSEG Nuclear, and Constellation. One of the biggest events for the region was the National Nuclear Science Week. Multiple chapters held numerous events near their facilities engaging and outreaching with their local communities. The majority of the chapters used this week to outreach with local 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> graders by having them participate in the annual drawing contest. We are working on again planning a combined regional event for the Northeast and Atlantic regions this time to be held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. We are planning on having this event be focused on why nuclear matters and the current economics of our industry.

#### **Southeast Region**

The Southeast region was actively engaged in both professional development and community outreach in 2013. Chapters offered a variety of options to encourage personal growth and facility knowledge transfer with activities like Nuclear Fundamentals classes, Lunch & Learn sessions, and by hosting guest speakers. As part of their commitment to educating the public and supporting nuclear, members of the Southeast Region spent time speaking to schools and the community, participated in Can-cycling competitions, and even sponsored students in a Recycled Fashion Show.

#### **West Region**

The 2013 year was a busy and eventful time for the West Region. We welcomed our 108th NAYGN chapter: Structural Integrity with locations in both San Jose and Denver, and are looking forward to their active involvement in NAYGN. In June, Palo Verde Young Generation in Nuclear (PV-YGN) hosted local Boy Scouts at Palo Verde Nuclear Plant, in Arizona, to learn about nuclear science and earn their Nuclear Merit Science Badge. Activities included a nuclear science presentation, dress out for radiation protection training, and ion chamber experiment. Approximately 30 Boy Scouts and their parents attended this event in February. Also in June, the Curtiss Wright West – Enertech Chapter had fun with strong participation in the Irvine Lake Mud Run.

In September, PV-YGN also visited Palo Verde Elementary School in Palo Verde, Arizona, to give a presentation on nuclear power. The children were also asked to each draw a picture of what they learned from the presentation. Activities included a nuclear science presentation, mini steam engine, nuclear dance, radiation demonstration and mouse trap reactor. PV-YGN members then voted on their favorite picture. An award of \$25 to the Arizona Science Center was given to the child who created the winning picture. Approximately 90 students (3 classes) were in attendance for the presentations.

The Diablo Canyon chapter experienced a huge surge in participation in 2013. The year's highlights included participation in the Waste Confidence public meeting held in San Luis Obispo, multiple public outreach events, and a holiday networking event that attracted over 50 members.

By no means a highlight, but in June Southern California Edison made the difficult decision to prematurely close the two units at San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station (SONGS) and transition the units into a decommissioning phase. As a result, the SONGS Chapter has since been dissolved.

#### **Sponsorship Committee**

The sponsorship committee continued to solicit sponsors and funds for NAYGN to use in implementing the organization's strategic plan initiatives for the year. The committee has utilized lessons learned and are developing innovative ways to stay on schedule and increase efficiency while still making it easy for companies to support the organization. In 2013, the sponsorship committee met all of the fundraising goals for the NAYGN operating budget and conference.

#### **Publications Committee**

The GoNuke! newsletter is an operative part of the NAYGN.org website. Archived articles can be found at <a href="http://naygn.org/category/go-nuke/">http://naygn.org/category/go-nuke/</a>. With the help of the website, GoNuke! has morphed from a seasonal newsletter to an online posting of what's new in NAYGN.

#### **Awards Committee**

The following are the 2013 award winners that will be recognized at the 2014 Professional Development Conference (with the exception of the Excellence Award)

- Excellence Award: This award is given to individuals or groups who have put in significant effort to accomplish NAYGN's mission. Though the Excellence Award winners are still nominated with the other awards, we are not presenting this award at the Professional Development Conferences going forward. The winners are included in Attachment 4.
- Best Chapter in Region: The winners are included in Attachment 5. This Award recognizes
  the efforts of local NAYGN chapters for services related to the growth of members
  through social, community service, and professional growth activities. This award salutes
  chapters for overall excellence in supporting NAYGN's mission and members and serving
  the industry.
- Best Chapter in Knowledge Transfer and Retention: This award is new and has been
  added to recognize a local chapter's commitment to addressing Knowledge Transfer and
  Retention (KTR) in the nuclear industry. This award salutes chapters for meeting NAYGN
  KTR objectives and innovating/advancing KTR practices. Special consideration is given to
  chapters that corroborate their achievements with references or other recognition. The
  winner this year is the INPO chapter.
- Chapter Achievement Award: This award is given from those selected from the Best Chapter in the Region and is a surprise at the Professional Development Conference. At the 2013 Conference, this award was given to the Duke Energy Chapter.
- Future Award: NAYGN recognizes the efforts of an individual, or a group that best exemplifies the mission of NAYGN to prepare and plan for the future of the young generation in the field of nuclear science and technology in an innovative or unique way. For 2013, the Future Award was given to Suzanne Hobbs Baker for her demonstration of a strong commitment to the NAYGN mission through her nuclear education efforts through her work at PopAtomic Studios and the Nuclear Literacy Project.
- Founder's Award: In 1999, seven people set forth to create an organization that embodied the spirit of young professionals in the nuclear industry. Their goal was to provide an organization that united these young professionals who believe in nuclear science and technology and are working together throughout North America to share their passion. This is the highest award given by NAYGN to an individual. It is presented to a member of NAYGN who exemplifies the efforts of the organization's Founders. This award was not given in 2013. The award winner for 2014 will be announced at the 2014 Professional Development Conference.
- Hairston Award: To recognize an executive who has gone above and beyond to support NAYGN by 1) Furthers NAYGN with their executive peers, 2) Supports both their local and continental chapters of NAYGN (including financially), 3) Spends time mentoring the organization. In 2013, this Award was given to Jim Scarola of Progress/Duke Energy.

The award winner for 2014 will be announced at the 2014 Professional Development Conference. .

### **Executive Advisory Committee**

A key pillar of NAYGN's successful engagement with our industry and community is our ability to interface with the highest levels of leadership and have an open dialogue regarding the strategic direction of our organization. This dialogue has allowed us to tailor our message and efforts so as not to duplicate those already taken on through other initiatives. That relationship with nuclear industry leaders continued this year through four meetings with members of our Executive Advisory Committee. Comprising leaders from utilities, manufacturers, fuel fabricators, education, and governmental relations throughout North America, the Executive Advisory Committee is representative of the broader nuclear industry. Last year, a charter was developed for this committee and a membership rotation schedule was established. Meetings this past year provided the necessary feedback which allowed us to guide us successfully through strategizing NAYGN's value proposition to the industry, and lay groundwork for long term sustainability of the organization.

#### **Bylaws and Rules**

The bylaws lead performed a major review and revision of the NAYGN rules and bylaws. All rules changes were approved by the Core and incorporated. All bylaws changes were approved by the Core and will be submitted to the membership for vote in 1Q 2014.

The proposed bylaws revision includes a fundamental change to the NAYGN membership criteria, which was vetted by the NAYGN Sustainability Committee. This change revises the three NAYGN membership grades (YG Members, Alumni, Honorary Alumni), and retains only the "YG members" grade for persons who have a professional interest in one or more fields of nuclear science and technology or allied fields. The age criterion for holding an elected (Core) position was retained –nominees must be under age 36 at time of nomination. This bylaws change is proposed to clearly communicate that NAYGN is an inclusive organization that welcomes participation from people of all ages and experience levels. Retaining the age criterion for elected positions ensures that the organization continues to be run by young professionals.

#### **Promotional Items**

The Café Press website continues to be a source for promotional items for NAYGN members. NAYGN provides a branding manual and copies of the NAYGN logo to local chapters who want to use other vendors to procure promotional items for their events. NAYGN also provides promotional items to new local chapters and to various regional events, on a case-by-case basis.

#### The Year in Review

With the commitment of our members and the sponsorship of many companies NAYGN has accomplished a multitude of significant events and activities over the past year. By working together on common goals, the young professionals of the industry are making great strides and will continue the momentum which started with 7 young professionals in 1999.






